Traditions

El Dia de Los Muertos (The Day of the Dead)

For those of Mexican heritage, November 2 means celebration of el Dia de Los Muertos, or "the Day of the Dead." Many join All Saints and All Souls together, first visiting the graves of babies and children on All Saints, since they are santitos (little saints) or angelitos (little angels). Flowers, their favorite toys, favorite music, and so on, are taken to them. The following day, they spend time—some of them all day—at the cemetery with their loved ones who have died. From the ancient customs of the Indians the families pray, talk with them, and take them their favorite food. The dead are not feared, but deeply loved, and this joyful family feast points both to age-old customs and Resurrection faith. There is a mocking of death as people make candy skeletons, and pan de muerto (bread of the dead) and consume them in a kind of role reversal.



One of the customs is to build an *altarcito* (little altar) where one places mementos and pictures of those who have died. There are also favorite foods, candles, statues or pictures of favorite saints, books, and Bibles. Some parishes have begun to build an *altarcito* where all parishioners can join in honoring the deceased. A remembrance book can be placed to write names in. The *altarcito* is traditionally left up for the month of November.

UNLEAVENED BREAD (bread of people moving on...refugees)

the aching and hurting we sometimes feel for what cannot be replaced or come back into our lives,

the unfinished places we had to leave before we were ready to move on to a new place.

. SALTINES

Let this bread (crackers) signify our tears the times when we had nothing but tears to express ourselves,

the times we felt betrayed, or diminished and lost our "feisty" or salty part of ourselves,

the times we ached for others or for our world and situations that were too big even comprehend,

the persons whose lives, choices or unfreedom we have not been able to touch and we cry for them.

TOGETHER: GOD, WE THANK YOU FOR THIS PART OF OUR LIVES.

.. FRESH BREAD

Let this bread signify our tomorrows and the surprises still ahead—

the changes in our bodies, minds, energy levels and involvements,

the surprises that each day ahead holds for us in the spirit of hope and wonder for the miracles God has in store for us,

the unforeseen blessings and support as we need more help with daily tasks and chores,

the everlasting and eternal surprise ahead in death and the power of the Resurrection for myself.

Bambinelli Blessing

Bambinelli is the Italian name for the figurine of Jesus that we display in our Christmas crèche under the tree. On Christmas Eve in 1223, St. Francis of Assisi began the custom of the Christmas crèche by having the people of his town in Greccio, Italy, create a living nativity scene, complete with men, women, and animals taking the parts of Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, angels, and the manger animals. It is believed that a real infant was placed in the manger to represent Jesus.




During his homily, St. Francis preached about the mystery and miracle of the Incarnation. From that night on, the tradition of having a creche in the home grew. In time, children were invited to bring the figure of the Baby Jesus—the Bambinelli—to church to be blessed before it was placed in the crib on Christmas morning by the youngest child.

Why not begin this tradition in your parish? It is a wonderful opportunity to bring families together the week before Christmas for a brief prayer service and an opportunity to give children a meaningful role in preparing for Christmas.

The Gradition of Oplatki

The sharing of love and peace is at the heart of this Slavic tradition. Catholics in Eastern European countries—especially Poland, Lithuania, Slovakia, and the Czech Republic—have generously shared this tradition with friends and families of different ethnic backgrounds. The tradition can be traced back to the early Christian Church.

The word oplatki means "wafer." The wafers, made with flour and water, are baked into a rectangle and imprinted or stamped with a Christmas image, most often the nativity.

The tradition has deep religious roots. We recall that God fed the Israelites manna in the desert. The word Bethlehem, where Jesus was born, means "house of bread." This family ritual is closely tied to the Eucharist, in which we share the Bread of Life, the Body and Blood of Jesus. Oplatki is often called the "Bread of Love." Just as we share in the Eucharist as one Christian family, sharing oplatki is a way of professing our love for the members of our family.

The sharing of oplatki takes place before the Christmas Eve meal. The ritual is very simple and can be done in several ways. In one option, which is how my family was introduced to the tradition, each person has his or her own wafer before beginning. Oplatki wafers are about the size of an index card.

To begin, a parent breaks off a piece of his or her own wafer and gives the piece to his or her spouse or a child; the spouse or child does the same, breaking off a portion of his or her own wafer and giving it in return. The two then exchange words of love. They might also share a special memory from the past year or tell each other what they admire or respect about the other person.

Then they both eat the piece of the wafer they were given. Next, these two move on separately to other family members, exchanging pieces of their own oplatki, exchanging words of love, perhaps a special memory from the past year, perhaps telling each other what they admire or respect most about the other. The ritual continues until everyone has exchanged words of love, forgiveness, or blessing with every other member of the household and eaten the piece of wafer they received from each person.

The process is not to be rushed. Ample opportunity should be allowed for people to truly share meaningful sentiments with all family members.

Another option is to use one wafer for the entire family. One of the parents gives every family member a piece of a single oplatki, large enough so that each person can break off a small piece to share with everyone else in the group. Then the ritual begins, with the parent breaking off a piece of his or her portion of the wafer and giving it to his or her spouse or a child, as described above.

The sharing of the oplatki is a wonderful classroom activity. Gather the children in a circle and give each a wafer. Explain its significance. Invite each child to break off a piece of the oplatki and share it with a classmate. Encourage each child to name some particular talent or gift he or she sees in the classmate with whom they are sharing the oplatiki. The kids are usually shy at first, so it would be good if you would initiate the sharing with several students, speaking sincerely to them about why they are valued members of your class. The kids will follow your lead and get into the Christmas spirit quickly.

Ask your catechetical leader where you can obtain oplatki locally or order them online. Simply type "oplatki" into your search engine. Most oplatki come in individual envelopes, along with directions for use and a brief explanation of the tradition. Send your students home with oplatkis to share with their families. You'll be surprised how quickly this will become a "must do" tradition among parish families!

Mary says "yes"

FOURTH STATION Angels sing to the shepherds



"Let's go to Bethlehem and see this new king," the shepherds said in great excitement. They found the baby Jesus lying in the manger. They told Mary and Joseph what the angels had said, and then they came back singing praises to God for all they had seen.




On the feast of Three Kings homes are blessed with blessed chalk and water.


HISTORY








As a child, St. Theresa (The Little Flower) used string of beads to count her sacrifices and acts of love done for God, in that way she was able to advance in perfection daily. You too, can grow in holiness by following the example of the Little Flower. Sacifice Beads are a string of ten beads, which can be pulled and remain in place. They are used to count the acts of love or sacrifice a person makes in a day for God. The string of sacrifice beads helps a person to grow in perfection by increasing their acts of love they do each day. The sacrifice beads we make also have a fixed Our Father bead on the end of them. Thus they double up as a rosary.

Directions to make St. Theresa's Sacrafice Beads

Need one crucifix, 10 beads (same or mixed colors), one length of string, one medal

- 1. string crucifix onto length of string to half way spot. tie a knot to secure the crucifix.
- string one bead onto string on one of the strings, then the other string through the same bead in opposite side, pull gently and loosely.
- 3. do next bead the same way
- 4. continue till all ten beads are threaded the same way.
- 5. tie another secure knot leaving 1/2" from the last bead. This is to give you space to "pull" your beads when you use them.
- 6. string medal on string up to the knot and tie a final knot. Cut excess off string. Secure final knot with glue or clear fingernail polish when you can.



Henceforth and forever as You have promised.



- 1. Collect your materials: For this homework assignment you will need a notebook (your prayer journal and/or this worksheet), a Bible, pen or pencil. If you don't have a Bible at home I have included the passage I would like you to reflect on for this assignment.
- 2. Choose a quiet place: Find a quiet place you can pray and enjoy God's presence without distraction.
- 3. Select a passage of Scripture: I have provided one for you to use for this assignment on the reverse side of this sheet
- 4. Begin with thanksgiving and prayer: Affirm that the Lord is with you. "Heavenly Father, I come into your presence. Jesus, I know You are here and that You love me. Thank You, Lord, that I belong to You. Thank you, Lord, that You want to speak to my heart today in scripture. Come, Holy Spirit, open my heart to truth...
- 5. Read: open your Bible or read the passage I have provided on the paper. Read the selected passage several times until a word, verse or verses capture your attention. Once you have a word, verse, or verses, begin on the worksheet on the reverse side
- 6. Fill out the WRAP worksheet on the reverse side: please feel free to write additional answers in your prayer journals from class

SEEING THE WORD: Visual Theology

The illuminations of the Saint John's Bible bring the text to life by giving them a visual form. They aren't simply pictures or illustrations of the stories in the Bible, but are paintings that come out of a long process of reflective living with the text. The illuminations are really spiritual meditations on the

word of God. What do images really have to do with prayer, and what can the arts tell us about God, the divine, and the sacred? These are two of the questions that visual theology attempts to ignite.

God is revealed to us not only in the realm of words and language, but in countless other ways as well. The history of Christian faith and theology is also a history of the eye, the ear, of bodily gesture and movement, the mind imagining, and the senses conjoining. Visual theology is a field that examines how the sense of sight is used to see the existence of God in the world and give it meaning to us as God's people. In our lives as Christians, visual theology claims that beauty is essential. Beauty not only excites and nourishes our feelings, thoughts, and imagination, but without beauty, truth and goodness become dull, lifeless, boring, and cold.2 God's beauty is displayed in all of creation; it draws us to God and to the mystery and glory of Christ on the cross.

But the beauty of the world is not the only concern of visual theology. When we use visual theology, we change our mode of communication from language and mathematics to the realm of imagination, so that intuition, the senses, and our own experiences and knowledge become primary.³ A work of art isn't just an object that is beautiful to its viewer; it becomes a tool to see

- a technique of examination and contemplation - that may lead the viewer in prayer.

Visio divina,

Latin for "Holy Seeing" or "Divine Looking," is a Christian prayer practice that creates an openness to encounters with God and the Word.4 It is similar to the sixth-century Benedictine practice of lectio divina in which one meditates on a passage of scripture allowing the Spirit to speak through the story, except in visio divina the Spirit is essentially revealed through images and feelings. the illuminations of the Saint John's Bible are suited perfectly for this unique form of visual contemplation and prayer, and they can even give us new insight into Biblical stories. Both the field of visual theology and the practice of visio divina enable us to know God and ourselves better as well as experience God's love more fully.

n his description of Jesus' final meal with his disciples, Luke emphasizes the intimacy of God's relationship with the people, celebrated in the Passover and sealed through the covenant ritual in Exodus 24. The significance of Passover is symbolized in the food. The participants, imitating the Israelites fleeing from Egypt, eat a meal of roasted lamb and unleavened bread, the fare of nomads on the move (see Exod 12:1-19).

Months later when the exodus generation arrived at Mount Sinai, God made a covenant with them, promising, "I will be your God and you will be my people" (see Exod 19:3-8). The covenant was sealed by a double ritual—a blood rite and a meal—signifying the sharing of life (Exod 24:1-11). Now God and the people have become "blood relatives." Jesus heightens the significance of this relationship,

MEDITATING

Ruminate on the word. Allow the word or passage to dwell within you.
Allow this pondering to invite you into dialogue with God and then, in the spirit of Pentecost, share the word with the group.

SEEING

Return to God's word for the purpose of "hearing and seeing" Christ in the text.

Fix your gaze on the illumination. Ask God to open the eyes of your heart and enable you to see what God wants you to see. Be open to images, thoughts, impressions, and feelings that come into your awareness.

uke describes two of the three cups of the Passover celebration. All three cups appear in the illumination. The design of the tablecloth, with its Star of David and its cross, reminds us that we Christians are allowed to share this sacred meal with our Jewish brothers and sisters. At the left we see the wine being offered at the Eucharist: "May the Lord accept this sacrifice." The Passover lamb takes center stage and its blood flows into the cup and overflows for us.

The new covenant continues to be offered to us in the twenty-first century. The right panel shows a ciborium. The bread of the Eucharist is reserved for the sick and all who suffer with Christ. Jesus eagerly desires to eat the Passover with us now. He who has taken on our flesh and blood desires to share life with us. In him God says over and over, "I will be your God and you will be my people."

PRAYING

Pray to God, allowing for the transformation of your being and feelings.
Give to God what you have found in your heart.

CONTEMPLATING

Notice the transforming presence of God within you. Surrender all that is stirring, even if only briefly, and rest in God's embrace. e who eat this bread and drink this cup are nourished by the life of Jesus and the blood of Jesus flows in our veins. This sharing of life makes us one body, intimately united as the living Body of Christ. Daily, weekly, we refresh this living unity. But there are serious implications of our oneness in Christ. Sharing the bread and wine demands of us that we care for all the members of Christ's Body,

especially the most vulnerable. How can we neglect those who have become our own flesh and blood? How can we refuse to feed the hungry and clothe the naked? How can we declare, "Those people are no concern of mine"? Participating in Eucharist is a radical commitment to love one another as Christ has loved us.

God Rocks.

I have always liked the "worry stone" idea. Carrying a smooth item in my pocket to rub during times of stress somehow offers comfort.

To bring this concept into our formation program lessons, I used to collect small pebbles and would have students draw faces of Jesus on them using permanent markers. The students loved the idea, but a few of the kids weren't happy with their drawings. It's not easy to draw on a small, uneven surface.

So our latest effort has been to use my own artwork glued to the rocks. The face of Jesus seems to "come alive." Instead of calling these "worry stones" we call them "God rocks." This name has a double meaning. The rocks are symbolic of the strength of God and the term (God rocks) fits the latest term for something amazing; we say "it rocks." Teens like to shout out "Our school rocks" or "Our team rocks." "God rocks" is another way of saying "God is the best!"

Give a God Rock

During the Advent and Christmas Seasons, God rocks take on another special meaning. They remind us that God gave us his only Son. The Son of God left the grandeur and glory of heaven to enter humanity in a human body, to be a helpless infant, and to lift up the poor by being born in a lowly stable. Giving a God rock to someone at any time during this season is to give a gift of inspiration, reassurance, and love.

- 1) You will need a clear glass craft rock for each God rock. These are sold at craft stores, dollar stores, and in some shops that sell aquarium supplies. (They are often used at the bottom of fish tanks.) Look for the ones that are clear and not frosted. These come in different sizes and tinted colors.
- 2) Copy the image of Jesus provided here to a reduced size that will fit on one of the rocks. Make enough copies so that each student has one—with some extra in case a child wants to "start over."
- 3) Place a rock over the image of Jesus and trace around the rock with a pencil. Add color to the *background* of the Jesus image using water-based markers.
- 4) Cut out the image of Jesus along the pencil lines.
- 5) Smear glue over the entire surface of the image of Jesus, rubbing it with a finger or a brush. (Regular glue is better than school glue for permanency.)



6) Press the artwork onto the rock. Gently rub the artwork to press it securely against the rock. Press hard. Some glue may come out around the edges of the artwork. Carefully wipe it off.

7) Allow the glue to dry. Share God rocks with everyone!
