WHAT IS YOUR EUCHARISTIC STORY?

"But, you see, we cannot live without this thing...our Lord Jesus as He comes to us in the Eucharist."

he first century of Christians inspired us with their heroic faith. Many risked all, giving even their lives, in order to practice the faith that Jesus imparted to the first disciples. Partaking in the Eucharistic meal in hiding, but faithfully, the early Christians passed the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice along to new converts as the Lord Jesus himself commanded, "Do this in remembrance of Me." On one occasion, a small group of Christians were caught in the act of celebrating the Eucharist, which the Roman emperor at the time had specifically outlawed. Imagine the tragic scene,

the owner of the home where the liturgy took place, tortured in an effort to coerce him to give up the identity of the priest who had offered the mass for them. That priest's name was never forthcoming. Exasperated, the Roman guard asked the homeowner, "Why would you do such a foolish thing? You have participated in something outlawed by the emperor, and now it will cost you your life!" To which the man replied, "I surrender my life then, because we cannot live without this. You see, there is no life within us apart from Our Lord Jesus, who gave himself to us in the Eucharist." How could that Roman guard ever have comprehended that response? In fact, how could the world ever come to appreciate what the Lord Jesus had done? Jesus gave all to us. Not only through His life and healing and teaching, but most importantly, through His sacrificial death: His death, which brought life to the lifeless and hope to the broken world. Well, the Romans and the world simply could not take in the truth and powerful spiritual reality of the Eucharist. At least not on a human level. This, the survival food which the Lord left for us, could only be understood with eyes of faith and the gift of faith from the Holy Spirit. Nothing short of a supernatural infusion of grace would ever move a person from utter ignorance or stubborn



unbelief to the beauty of knowing, from the heart, that receiving the Lord, body, blood, soul, and divinity in the Eucharist, is our closest, most intimate connection to Him and through Him to eternal life. And in their faithfulness, those early believers just did what they had been taught, even if it meant giving up their lives in order to celebrate the Holy Meal. The Lord himself, through the power of their witness, washed the world in His grace and belief grew among Jews, Gentiles and even Romans. The Lord through the sacrifice of the Son and the power of the Holy Spirit began to renew the face of the earth

Have you personally received this grace? If you are reading this, you likely participate in Mass, and receive our Lord regularly. But do you pray, asking the Lord on a regular basis to renew you in the graces that come with the sacrament? Has there been a moment when the reality of what you are receiving really hit home to you and touched your heart? A parish priest I know, began an adult catechesis session with the phrase, "Lord, help us if we are adults with a second grade understanding of the Eucharist." That struck me. His point is well taken. Even with very good childhood catechesis, the depth of our understanding of our faith should grow with us. I should assume that there is much more that I can appreciate about the Eucharist, and my participation in it. If I am giving the Lord my attention and my open heart long enough, He will show me how He nourishes and sustains me when I receive His Body and Blood. Challenged by this recently, I looked to the ever wise and moving writings of the Church fathers: "As two pieces of wax fused together make one, so he who receives Holy Communion is so united with Christ that Christ is in him, and he is in Christ." - St. Cyril of Alexandria What an image! Thanks St. Cyril! The Lord Jesus has waited a long time for me to know that He sacrificed his life so that I could melt into him. Now, this

is what I imagine at Mass as I receive Him.

What is your Eucharistic story?

We are all part of a large Eucharistic community, the Church. And as part of a community, a family we should be aware of our story within it. There have been times and places when the Lord has caught me by the heart in a particular way and deepened my sense of His grace within me. He has done this in my reception of the Eucharist many times. One memorable time for me was on the occasion of one of our kids' first communion celebration. Just a few years before that day, the Lord called myself and my husband Paul into a much deeper appreciation of our faith and drew us into a conversion experience (although we had both been cradle Catholics). This was a time of much deeper learning and appreciation of the sacraments. But on this particular morning of our daughter's first communion, during the preparation of the gifts, I was overwhelmed with a sense of the true privilege it is to receive the Lord and further to be able to bring my child to the Holy Meal. In my mind, I pictured the many who even gave their lives in order for me to be able to come with my child to receive this grace. I can't really describe this grace filled experience, but it was more than just an idea. It was a deep gratitude, a thanksgiving to be able to partake. Eucharist means thanksgiving, so how appropriate. That day, I was so moved by love and appreciation, that by the time I approached to receive Him, I was a bit teary and could hardly say AMEN. I cannot say that I have ever been touched this way since that day but remembering that outpouring helps me connect with the genuine truth of the Real Presence and our privilege to participate. "You see, we cannot live without this, our Lord in the Eucharist." How true!

So, what is your Eucharistic story? I know that the Lord heals in the Eucharist. I have seen this. Is that your story? I know that the Lord speaks into the hearts of those who receive Him, bringing comfort and mercy. Has that been your experience? 

The Charismatic Gift of Prophecy This gift of prophecy is one of the charismatic gifts, meaning that it is a gift from the Holy Spirit, that is meant to be given away, and has an edifying power to build up the Church. This gift does, however, also include a power that impacts the heart of the Prophet as well as the community. It is defined as speaking a message from God through the Holy Spirit. The prophetic word can release someone else into their


calling, by providing The Holy Spirit's message of encouragement and destiny from God. There are multiple ways that prophecy can be manifested and conveyed, through visions, dreams, or messages. In

ACTS 2, After the Holy Spirit fell upon all in the upper room at Pentecost, St. Peter proclaimed to the crowd that these gifts would be given to all. He spoke of the prophet Joel's prophecy of how the Lord would pour out His spirit and that "Your sons and daughters will prophesy; your old men will dream dreams your young men will see visions."-JOEL 3

Pope Francis states ..."Prophecy is born whenever we allow ourselves to be challenged by God, not when we are concerned to keep everything quiet and under control. Only someone who is open to God's surprises can become a prophet." Prophetic activity enables us to "not save up ourselves but to spend ourselves for others."

St. Benedict - died 547, feast day July 11. Founder of the Benedictine monastery at Monte Cassino and father of Western monasticism; the Rule that he established became the norm for monastic living throughout Europe. Living in a cave as a hermit, and after years of prayer, word of Benedict's holiness brought nearby monks to ask for his leadership. He warned them he would be too strict for them, but they insisted -- then tried to poison him when his warning proved true. The monks attempted to poison Benedict's drink, but when he prayed a blessing over the cup - it shattered. One of the powerful weapons in spiritual combat is the St. Benedict medal. Honored and employed for centuries, this medal has been associated with many miracles, as well as with powers of exorcism.

he Feast of Corpus Christi, the Latin words translated to "Body of Christ", is observed this year on Thursday, June 16th which is the second Thursday after Whit Sunday, the Christian High Holy Day of Pentecost. It is the seventh Sunday after Easter, which commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Christ's disciples (Acts 2). This is a Catholic holiday that celebrates the presence of the body and blood of Jesus Christ through Holy Communion (Eucharist).

Why do Catholics celebrate Corpus Christi? The Catholic Church honors Christ's Presence in the Holy Eucharist with a special feast owing to St. Juliana of Liège, a 13th-century Norbertine canoness from Belgium. She had a great love for the Eucharist. When she was 16, she had a vision in which the Church was a full moon with a dark spot. The dark spot signified that the Church was missing a feast dedicated solely to the Body and Blood of Christ. Even though she had this vision several times, St. Juliana didn't think that she could do anything to help institute this feast. Therefore, she kept it a secret for many years. Once she was elected prioress, she finally told her confessor, who in turn told the bishop. This eventually led to the universal feast of Corpus Christi.

Why is the Solemnity of Corpus Christi important? The Eucharist is the "source and summit of the Christian life." In the Eucharist, Jesus Himself re-presents for our benefit His Sacrifice on Calvary, gives Himself to us in Holy Communion, and remains among us until the end of the age. He comes to us in this humble form, making Himself vulnerable, out of love for each one of us.

Centuries later, the tradition continues at many parishes in the Archdiocese of St. Louis.



What is the Corpus Christi procession?

Whenever the Eucharist is exposed for adoration, prayer, Benediction, and public processions, it is placed in a sacred vessel called a Monstrance, whose clear glass permits the viewing of the Sacred Host. These processions go throughout the city while the faithful usually sing and pray, all in honor of our Eucharistic King. This practice began in the 14th-century, and it has been promoted by popes, councils, and saints as a wonderful way to show the supreme importance of the Eucharist and the love that we have for Him.

The St. Anthony of Padua procession has been celebrated for over 140 years

The St. Louis Cathedral Basilica celebrates Corpus Christi with a procession and evokes solemn veneration from all as Knights of Columbus stand guard. Four times the procession will come to a halt, the priest will sing solemnly the beginning of one of the four Gospels and each time there will be Solemn Benediction, and those of all ages kneel in adoration.
